The pipe organ now in St Faith's has been enlarged from an instrument originally built for the Strathalbyn Street Methodist Church, East Kew.

That church was built in 1952, and a member of the congregation who had opposed its being built gave the organ, at a cost of £3000, as a lasting tribute to his wife, then recently deceased. The donor, Mr Jack Wilson, himself died a few weeks later, never hearing or seeing the fruits of his gift.

That instrument, dedicated in June 1955, was built by George Fincham and Sons. It had two manuals and pedals, and was extended from 5 ranks, namely, diapason, dulciana, flute, salicional and oboe. It was completely enclosed within a swell box behind a vertical grille of heavy timber, It had no display pipes.

In 1968 Mr Fred Bishop had a celeste stop added in memory of his wife, Gertrude.

The Strathalbyn Street congregation joined with the East Kew Presbyterian Church in 1976 and sold both church and organ to the Masonic Lodge on the understanding that the organ would remain as part of the building. However, within a short time it was sold to Christ Church, Ormond. Christ Church already had the first Fincham organ built in Melbourne, and hoped to combine the two instruments. This plan could not be carried out, and so in May 1977 the organ was again up for sale, still dismantled. It was then—at an emergency meeting on the morning of Saturday 14 May—that the vestry of St Faith's decided to buy it.

The considerable task of rebuilding the organ was entrusted to John Parker, an organ builder of Burwood. The vestry decided to add a II-rank mixture, and a further rank, the tierce, was given by Miss Marjorie Béchervaise, a parishioner, in memory of her father. In all the organ now has nominally 24 speaking stops (7 ranks extended + mixture), totalling approximately 570 pipes.

The foresight of the original architect of St Faith's was again demonstrated, since he had provided for an organ chamber behind the altar.

The work of rebuilding the organ was completed only because of the contributions of all parishioners. The dismantled instrument was transported from Ormond by parishioners, and some men of the parish worked with Mr Parker on the carpentry in the organ chamber.

The cost of the organ was met in various ways. Although the final cost is not certain, the purchase price was \$4,500 and the mixture and the cost of rebuilding together amounted to \$5,587. There had been an organ fund for many years, and in 1976 and 1977 this was augmented in various ways, notably through the work of the Women's Guild. At the time of purchase this fund stood at \$4,100. A further \$6,000 was given by parishioners. Some donations were given as memorial gifts, and these are recorded in the memorial book to be found in the cabinet near the pulpit. This not only has the cost of the organ and rebuilding, but also included some money in hand for the continuing cost of maintenance.

This brief history would not be complete without a tribute to the then vicar of St Faith's, Revd D G Cobbett, through whose inspiration and guidance the contribution of all those connected with this project has been combined and brought to fruition.
